

President's Message

A SUMMONS TO YOUR THEORETICAL DUTIES

Psychoanalytic theory is not developed in trances, dreams, or rituals. Also, it does not emerge from scientific studies of brain cells, circuits, or molecular genetics. Psychoanalytic theory is humanistic, individualistic, complex, and developmental. There are few university departments devoted to its advance. We advance it in practice-based and educational settings.

Some insist that each patient-clinician pair is so unique that theory actually obscures new understanding. I disagree. Psychoanalytic theory progresses, informs, and enriches. Actually, it emerges from arguments connected by a shared valuation of sober pursuit of truth.

Psychoanalysis is an interpretive kind of science. Our theory is objective about subjectivity. We keep, dissolve, and recrystallize our consensus. To survive as a school, the faculty must talk, talk, and continue talking to each other. Above all, we need to share our observations and experiences. We need to both prune and augment our curriculum. Towards these ends, I will ask the faculty to update its areas of expertise for faculty lists. We can use these categories to aid selection of who we may ask to teach, where, and whom.

Towards these ends we need more leaders: presidential nominees, chairs and vice-chairs for committees and divisions. We need to give these leaders more opportunities to teach than people who reject leadership responsibilities. More writing is needed from our membership. I hope study groups can help members prepare papers for publication and presentation.

Efforts in this regard are paying off in terms of alleviating our "in the red" budget projections. The extension, "year-long," and psychotherapy-oriented programs have brought in an increase in tuitions and fees. No members should be disenfranchised from the opportunity of having dialogue with each other and the community at large. To avoid isolation, you who are not taking part "in the dialogue" need to press into the discussions by joining organizational groupings. You who are already "in" need to assume leadership roles. Please consult Sandie Schaaf or me on how to increase your participation.

Fall has arrived and with it a roster of exciting, intellectually stimulating programs from the Membership Services Division. The **Scientific Meeting Committee**, chaired by Peter Goldberg, began the year with a presentation by Kimberlyn Leary. This first Scientific Meeting also marked the initial test run of WebEx, a web-based video conferencing tool that SFCP has acquired on a four month trial basis. (Please see the CESD column for more information regarding our use of WebEx.) We are very excited about the possibility of better communication with our members around the Bay. Ken Corbett will be the presenter at our October Scientific Meeting and in November our Visiting Professor, David Tuckett will be the speaker. We are very grateful for this committee's efforts in providing us with a wonderfully diverse series of psychoanalytic presentations.

The **Postgraduate Education Committee**, chaired by Sue Von Baeyer, has two course offerings for postgraduate members this fall. "Psychic Change in Seriously Disturbed Patients: Case Study", with seminar leader Helen Schoenhals Hart, will meet over the course of four months to discuss forms of pathological organization in seriously disturbed patients. Clinical material from participants will be used to illustrate theoretical concepts useful in working analytically with more disturbed patients. "An Introduction to the Clinical Contributions of Donald Meltzer: Historical Precedents and Links to Current Practice" with seminar leaders Abbot Bronstein and Georgine Marrott will offer an opportunity to participants to read and discuss a sampling of writings from this prodigious and prolific analyst to give an introduction to his thoughts and ideas about psychoanalysis and their clinical application. We want to especially thank Sue Von Baeyer and the seminar leaders for their work in organizing these seminars that are making an excellent contribution to the revitalization of our postgraduate educational programming.

Once again this fall we are also bringing back the **Clinical and Theoretical Forums**, moderated by Peter Goldberg and Henry Markman. The Clinical Forum for Postgraduate members has been a very popular format for clinical discussion of case material presented by a member. The Theoretical Forum, initiated this past spring and open to postgraduate members and candidates, has had the goal of discussing and developing our personal clinical theories via a structured group discussion. We look forward to continuing the discussion in order to evaluate and compare our theoretical positions on a variety of topics.

The **CME/CE Committee**, chaired by Julie Stahl, continues to work hard on behalf of the SFCP membership. This fall the committee will complete the application for SFCP to be re-accredited as a provider of Continuing Medical Education. The CME/CE Committee is also moving forward with planning a workshop on cultural competency in psychoanalysis for the SFCP faculty. This workshop will be presented in conjunction with a representative from the Institute for Medical Quality's Cultural and Linguistic Competency Program. This will be an interesting and informative workshop on a key mandated component of our Continuing Medical Education program.

This is the second SFCP Newsletter to be produced online. The SFCP staff has done a marvelous job so far in producing the Newsletter, however we are still seeking SFCP Members interested in volunteering to work on the newsletter. Community Education & Service Division: Autumn Highlights

The fall has launched an impressive season for CESD programs. Most notable has been the popularity of the San Francisco Extension Division's Year Long Program, *Neither Dead Nor Alive: Psychoanalytic Approaches to Healing Perverse Relationships*, which began on September 18th. The course filled very quickly after the catalogue was released and registration continued well into the summer. Rather than turn so many interested people away, the SF Extension Division Committee recruited a group of outstanding faculty and a second section of the course was created. Special acknowledgement goes to the chair Meryl Botkin for so quickly, creatively and effectively responding to the needs of the community and the Center.

In May SFCP celebrated the graduation of the first class to complete the Palo Alto Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Training Program (PAPPTP). This fall a new class of nine students began the two-year intensive training. The success of this program is due to the hard work of the PAPPTP faculty, and, especially, Program Chair, Ric Almond and Outreach Chair, Cheryl Goodrich. We welcome the PAPPTP students to the SFCP community and hope they will become active participants in Center activities.

The **Community Members Committee** has been very active with the start of the new academic year, and has introduced several new programs (see September's Newsletter for a comprehensive description of the committee's activities). Most notable is our expansion into Marin with a monthly North Bay Clinical Forum, inaugurated very successfully on September 8th. Chaired by Sunny Kuegle, Helen Schoenhals Hart, and Robert Waska, the CMC hopes to reach what has been, up till now, an underserved population of psychoanalytically interested psychotherapists. SFCP has recently begun exploring the use of the internet to provide remote access to San Francisco programs and to develop distant learning opportunities in our educational programs. Last spring we experimented with using Skype to provide remote video access to members in the South Bay. However, we learned that Skype would only allow a few remote locations to view live video. Thanks to the efforts of Development Director Jeff Miller, SFCP has acquired, on a 4 month trial basis, a web-based video conferencing tool, **WebEx**, which will enable us to reach a greater number of our members and, in addition, provide us with useful teaching, training, presentation and archiving tools. WebEx is also capable of recording the video, which can then be made available to members to view at their leisure on their own computers. For programs that have a registration fee, the video can be made available via the internet for a fee. We had our first test run broadcasting Kimberlyn Leary's Scientific Meeting to six different remote sites on September 14th. Although we had several technical glitches that prevented some sites from logging into the session, we have learned a lot, and as we continue to improve our WebEx skills, will be making remote access available to more members. If you are interested in viewing the recording of Dr. Leary's presentation on your computer, please contact Susanna Bonetti. Stay tuned for updates on our use of WebEx and video conferencing in the coming months.

The Community Education and Service Division is large and includes a variety of educational, outreach and service programs and committees, many of which are often in need of new members. Curricular/Training Goals for SFCP

At its September meeting, the Training Division approved the following set of curricular goals for analytic training at SFCP, developed over the last two years by the CECC.

Curricular/Training Goals for SFCP September 2009

1. Candidates learn to conduct psychoanalysis.
2. Candidates have a firm grounding in Freud and substantial exposure to seminal works of major subsequent theorists and schools they represent.
3. Candidates learn to think systematically about psychoanalytic concepts and to compare, contextualize and evaluate critically different approaches to clinical phenomena.
4. Candidates learn to think from a psychoanalytic perspective about how the mind develops from infancy to adulthood.
5. Candidates learn to read psychoanalytic literature critically and closely.
6. Candidates refine receptivity to unconscious processes.
7. Candidates learn thinking and writing skills that may be applied to creative participation in the larger psychoanalytic dialogue.
8. Candidates learn to think theoretically about their clinical work and to articulate and critique their own theories.
9. Candidates develop an appreciation of group process and of working in groups.
10. Candidates examine critically how child and adult analysis inform each other.
11. Candidates examine links between psychoanalytic theory and data from related fields.
12. Candidates learn to appreciate the broader application of psychoanalytic ideas in the community at large.

SFCP BOOKSTORE PRESENTS

***Boyhoods: Rethinking Masculinities*, by Ken Corbett**

Familiar and expected gender patterns help us to understand boys but often constrict our understanding of any given boy. Writing in a wonderfully robust and engaging voice, Ken Corbett argues for a new psychology of masculinity, one that is not strictly dependent on normative expectation. As he writes in his introduction, "no two boys, no two boyhoods are the same." In *Boyhoods* Corbett seeks to release boys from the grip of expectation as Mary Pipher did for girls in *Reviving Ophelia*.

Corbett grounds his understanding of masculinity in his clinical practice and in a dynamic reading of feminist and queer theories. New social ideals are being articulated. New possibilities for recognition are in play. How is a boy made between the body, the family, and the culture? Does a boy grow by identifying with his father, or by separating from his mother? Can we continue to presume that masculinity is made at home? Corbett uses case studies to defy stereotypes, depicting masculinity as various and complex. He examines the roles that parental and cultural anxiety play in development, and he argues for a more nuanced approach to cross-gendered fantasy and experience, one that does not mistake social consensus for well-being. Corbett challenges us at last to a fresh consideration of gender, with profound implications for understanding all boys.

Ken Corbett is Clinical Assistant Professor at the New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis. He is an analyst in practice with adults and children in New York City.
