

Follow-up Report from the Chair

I would like to report back to the membership on two matters: an update on the follow-up meeting with PINC representatives regarding the co-location possibility and some further impressions following the second of our five planned, regional "town hall" meetings with the Peninsula Group in early February.

First, the discussions with PINC about the possibility of co-location resulted in a very amicable and mutually arrived at conclusion that this would not be a feasible undertaking at this time. The surveys conducted by each group of its respective membership revealed a very similar pattern-- on the one hand, considerable enthusiasm for combining resources and energies to both of our advantages, but on the other hand, a serious concern about the challenging practicalities of working out the financial, logistic, legal and identity issues at the current time and in the urgency of the moment. This is of special concern to SFCP for whom prompt attention must be given to moving ahead with our own relocation plans.

Not unrelated to these matters are some themes emerging from the meeting of the SFCP leadership with the Peninsula Group that reiterate concerns expressed at the prior East Bay Group meeting. (I expect these issues will be underscored even further in our upcoming meeting with the Sacramento/Davis Group.) These concerns cluster around the increasingly problematic practicalities of commuting to the City for meetings of any kind, especially during the weekdays and weekday evenings. For those who do not live or work in the City and wish to continue to attend meetings at SFCP, it is a top priority for us to relocate near public transport and freeway access. Equally strong is the interest in upgraded technological capacities for state-of-the-art transmission of programs, meetings and classes that would permit local participation of our membership from other geographic locations. There is also important and substantial education and

outreach being done in the local regions beyond the standard programming held at the Center. With respect to these increasing activities in the local communities, I would recommend to the Board consideration of the notion of eventual, organizational re-structuring with a central intellectual and administrative home in the City along with regional campuses, which ideally would include some physical spaces for the outlying campuses. Although this consideration might prove fiscally unrealistic, this paradigm is already implicit in the PAPPTP program.

Of course, we must also take into consideration the impact this model could have on the experience of intellectual discourse and debate in our Center. Neither individual treatment nor discussion on a larger level is the same when interlocutors are not in each other's physical presence. The cohesion and depth of a group's work (at a scientific meeting or in a teaching situation, for example) are not comparable when the group's members are congregated together in the same space as opposed to being dispersed locationally, even if connected by technological means.

In addition, the impact on the feel of an organization will be profound if there is not a strong identification with and attachment to its physical center. Overcoming fragmentation through technological hook-up must be balanced against the forces of separation due to lack of proximal contact in one mutually sought location. It is of paramount importance for us that this is a moment in our history for forging a cohesive identity in our still relatively new identity as a Center. Here there is work yet for us to do amongst ourselves on a number of different levels.

What goes on at the Board of Trustees and can members attend?

Yes! All SFCP members are welcome to attend the Board meeting. The SFCP Board of Trustees (BOT) meets on the last Monday evening of the month from September through June. The meetings are two hours in duration from 7:30 until 9:30. There are times throughout the year when confidential issues, i.e, personnel issues, are discussed and the BOT meets in executive session. These meeting would be closed to visitors. Please check with the Chair or Jeff Miller, the COO in advance just to make certain these issues aren't on the agenda.

The primary responsibility of the BOT is to support the mission of the organization as articulated in the Mission statement: **The San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis is dedicated to advancing the vitality and enduring value of psychoanalysis in Northern California.**

Like most other non-profit boards the SFCP Board of Trustee focuses its work on major policy issues and fiscal oversight. While some analyst trustees have operational responsibilities within the organization on various committees, the Board's role is to:

- *Develop and refine The Center's strategy.*
- *Oversee the use of organizational resources as financial stewards.*
- *Guard and maintain focus on carrying out the mission.*
- *Assure that The Center's by-laws and structure support the mission.*
- *Advocate and raise funds for The Center.*
- *Provide expert advice to staff and volunteers to advance The Center's work.*
- *Assure that The Center develops its capabilities over time as internal and external conditions change.*

This mission statement calls upon the Board of Trustees to establish policies that address each of the following:

- Provide training and continuing education of psychoanalysts, mindful of the needs of our local and extended communities.
- Promote the understanding of and regard for psychoanalysis in the mental health community and community at large.
- Make affordable psychoanalytically-oriented services available to patients, programs, and institutions.
- Support and enrich the professional lives of members.
- Further psychoanalytic knowledge and practice through writing, research, and public presentation.

An additional function of the BOT is building its own capacity to provide the three major functions of non-profit boards – doing work, offering wisdom, and gathering wealth – by expanding the mix of skills.

Community Membership Survey Results

Thanks to all who took the time to complete the recent membership survey. We had a 14% response rate, not bad for surveys. Our apologies for the bugs initially noted in the survey and our appreciation for those of you who notified us. The results are as follows:

The top three reasons members endorsed for joining SFCP was the opportunity to have a professional home, discounts for programs and building a referral network.

Members found the psychotherapy forums as the most rewarding benefit of membership. This was followed by extension division courses, networking opportunities and program discounts.

The majority of members endorsed that they would like the opportunity to receive referrals to their practice and share information about marketing, clinical issues and psychoanalytic perspectives.

The majority of those who completed the survey have been a Community Member from 2-5 years.

The most popular reason given for not taking advantage of CM events was that our members don't have enough time.

In terms of practical topics, our members indicated that they were most interested in improving their clinical skills, marketing their practice and expanding their practice in outreach, consultation, writing or speaking engagements.

In terms of feeling welcomed by the Center, many of you indicated that you did feel welcome and that the majority would appreciate having a welcome reception for current and new members.

Outcome

The feedback given in the survey is important to us. In response, we are planning to hold a yearly reception for current and new members in order to facilitate networking, socializing and maintaining a professional home. Haskell Norman Prize for Excellence in Psychoanalysis

Release: The Haskell Norman Prize for Excellence in Psychoanalysis for 2011 to be awarded to Robert Stolorow, Ph.D. of Los Angeles, CA

The Haskell Norman Prize Committee awards analysts who have made major contributions to psychoanalytic theory, clinical achievement, psychoanalytic education or applied psychoanalysis. This year a \$5,000 prize and certificate acknowledging the occasion will be awarded to Robert Stolorow, Ph.D. for his many achievements in all of these fields. At the October 2011 scientific meeting of the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis which commemorates the Haskell F. Norman Prize, Dr. Stolorow will present an original paper and receive the award.

Dr. Stolorow is a founding member of the Institute of Contemporary Psychoanalysis, Los Angeles; founding faculty member of the Institute of the Psychoanalytic Study of Subjectivity, NYC; and a clinical professor of psychiatry at UCLA School of Medicine. He is the author of numerous books, among them, *Trauma and Human Existence*; *Structures of Subjectivity: Explorations in Psychoanalytic Phenomenology*; *World, Affectivity, Trauma: Heidegger and Post-Cartesian Psychoanalysis*; *Contexts of Being: The Intersubjective Foundations of Psychological Life*; as well as many papers on psychoanalysis.


